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From the Rear Commodore

The big news this month is that RRYC is now officially in the pile driving business! There has been a lot of discussion about making the outside of the tee head friendlier to a wider variety of boats. The solution that the board agreed on (there were several proposals) was to install six new fiberglass piles midway between the seven existing wooden posts. Although we approached a couple of local contractors to drive them, we decided to install them ourselves partly to save money and partly so that we retained control of the schedule. The piles arrived from Georgia two weeks ago and were driven the day after they arrived. You may have seen the rather odd looking wooden structure sitting on the dock for the last month or so, but that was wheeled out to end of the dock and we used it to lift the piles into place and then to drive them using an old fashioned drop weight (120 pounds) made from concrete.

Our pile driving crew included:

Shaun Thaxter (who did most of the weight hoisting)
Greg Kirkbride
Tom Wicks

Ian Ormesher
Jackie Allen (our newest and first lady beaver)

It was a morning's work, and we now have six new piles fastened to the side of the tee head and driven about five feet into the creek bed – the piles were 20 feet long, 8 inches in diameter and they weighed about 100 pounds each. I am very proud of our crew – the total cost of the installation was \$3,250. The only external quote we obtained was for six wooden piles and the \$4,500 did not include attachment to the dock.

As far as the Rear Commodore is concerned, this is the end of new dock construction and I am confident that the dock will be in place for a long time. Although it was the most expensive capital project the club has ever undertaken, the contribution of the beavers and other volunteers during the construction reduced the cost considerably. Those contributions included:

- Installing all the cleats
- Installing the line hangars
- Routing the corners of the finger pier posts and painting their tops
- Making and installing the wooden bumper posts on the tee head – 13 in all

- Installing the protection for the two pedestals on the tee head
- Installing all the slip number plates
- Installing the wooden ladders as requested by individual slip holders
- Installing the aluminum safety ladders
- Installing the posts for the fire extinguishers and the life rings
- Installing the pedestal bases

The beavers have also completed the replacement of the decking on the walkway down the side of the club house to the dock.

Wildfire is back in the water with a brand new topside paint job. Rappahannock Yachts has done a fine job under the meticulous supervision of George Kuper, and I hope the members like the new grey color – I think it looks very smart.

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RRYC Weather Station

Have you ever decided not to sail with the kids on Carter's Creek because of a gloomy wind forecast...only to read a later Headway article describing one of the best sailing days of the season?

Thanks to the 15 RRYC sailors who funded the industrial model weather station for RRYC, and thanks as well to Michael and Susan Tempest for offering to have the station placed on their Crab Point property. The weather station is located to starboard as you enter Carter's Creek from the Rappahannock River, opposite daybeacon R "4". It is the only local location on the northern side of the Rappahannock with

exposure to the northerly winds which are critical in providing microclimate level hyper-local updates every minute.

"How do I access the current weather at Crab Point?"

- Enter https://rainwise.net/weather/rrycweather into your web browser (RainWise is the manufacture of the RRYC commercial weather station)
- A RainWiseNET dashboard updates Crab Point weather every minute.
- Bookmark the page address in your browser and you are two clicks away from viewing the RRYC
 Crab Point weather!

"How do I obtain forecasts from Crab Point?"

- RainWise shares Crab Point data with two free forecasting apps Weather Underground and SailFlow. Registering with an app allows you to save local personal weather station locations such as Crab Point RRYC, Sanders Cove, and Hummel Field. Both apps have upgraded, fee-based, ad-free, versions which offer added forecasting features.
 - o Weather Underground Station ID: KVAWEEMS7 (nter in "Search Locations" window) o SailFlow Station: Crab Point RRYC
- Sailflow is one of the most popular apps for racers. When viewing a complete report of Crab Point RRYC on SailFlow, scroll to the bottom of the report to "Station Info" and note the 'Data courtesy of RRYC" entry in cluding a link directly to the RRYC web page.



A few weeks later he won the RRYC Messing About in Boats Regatta. Before all this he spent four weeks at Premier Sailing this summer and learned a ton.



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
